In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Library closed on March 13 and will remain so until further notice. While we pride ourselves on being open and welcoming to all, and we are often the very place people visit when times are hard, staying closed is the best thing we can do right now in the interest of public health.

- Please do not worry about returning any library materials you may have at this time; due dates have been extended through September 30. Library cards that were set to expire have been extended until December 31.

- Though our building is closed, we are still here for you. Our staff has been working tirelessly to provide you with the level of service you have come to expect. Hundreds of eBooks and downloadable audiobooks have been added to OverDrive; we have ordered many titles that are currently only available for Baldwin cardholders.
- Our borrowing limits for streaming services Hoopla and Kanopy have been raised.
- We seamlessly transitioned to offering innovative virtual programming. Information about our upcoming programs is available on our website and is sent to the community each week as an eBlast.

In an effort to improve access to digital services during this time, the Baldwin Public Library has enabled the use of a digital card should you not already possess a library card. If you have a library card then you already have full access to our digital resources. Upon approval, your card will last until September 1. Please note that this card is for digital services only, and cannot be used to borrow physical materials from any public library in Nassau County.



These applications are not automated. Please be patient as we do the best we can to get your digital card to you quickly. The Nassau Library System will create your card as soon as possible and transmit this information to you via email. Results from the 2020 Census will be used to determine the number of seats each state has in Congress and your political representation at all levels of government.


#### Eight Perfect Murders by Peter Swanson

#### Sisters by Choice by Susan Mallery

#### Red, White & Royal Blue by Casey McQuiston


